## ENEMY REPORTS NEW ALLIED LANDINGS ON COAST OF NORTHERN FRANCE

Bridgehead Gains Ground CONFIDENCE AT SUPREME HEADQUARTERS

Normandy Front Now Sixteen Miles In Length

LATE LAST NIGHT reports were still coming in from enemy sources of new Allies landings on the coast of Northern France, with an acknowledgment that the initial invasion of Normandy had gained ground until the coastal bridgehead between Villiers-sur-Mer and Trouville "was about 20 kilometres (164 miles) in length and a few kilometres in depth."

A German Radio report, quoted by Algiers Radio—for which there was no confirmation in London—stated that Allied landings had taken place at Calais and Boulogne, while Sertorius, the military commentator, wrote that following the morning's attack on the coastal stretch between the Seine and Vire estuaries there had been an extension of the Allied zone of operations "covering the entire peninsula."

Supreme Headquarters, Allied Expeditionary Force, stated last night that while it is still far too carly to assess the position in Normandy, the opposition to the expedition as far as the beaches was less than expected and there is no cause for pessimism.
