## LAUNCESTON.

WITH ST. THOMAS AND ST. STEPHENS.

LAUNCESTON, the "Lanscavetone" of Domesday, is in municipal documents styled "Launceston, otherwise Dunheved," although they were originally distinct places. Launceston is the capital of Cornwall, a royal and municipal borough, market and union town and head of a county court district, on the border of the county, adjoining Devonshire, and on the high road to Truro and Falmouth. It has a terminal station on a branch of the Great Western railway from Plymouth. There is also a station here on the London and South Western railway, which, since 1889, has been extended to Wadebridge and Padstow. Launceston is 213 miles by road from London, 258½ by the Great Western via Plymouth, 223½ by the London and South Western railway via Okehampton, 24 by road and 35½ by Great Western railway and 47½ by London and South Western railway via Okehampton from Plymouth, 40 from Exeter and 13½ by road and 18½ by rail north-west from Tavistock. The Bude canal, 21½ miles in length, and terminating at Druxton, in the parish of Werrington, 2 miles north-east of the town, is now disused. The river Kensey passes through and the great London road crosses the borough from east to west. The town is in the North Eastern division of the county, northern division of the hundred of East, petty sessional division of East North, rural deanery of Trigg Major, archdeaconry of Bodmin and diocese of Truro.

Under the provisions of the "Local Government Act, 1894" (56 and 57 Vict. ch. 73), the parishes of Lawhitton, St. Stephens and St. Thomas Apostle have each been divided into Urban and Rural, the former being in each case the parts included in the municipal borough.

On the 28 June, 1199, King John granted a charter to the Priory of Launceston, and there are existing charters granted to the borough by Richard, Earl of Poitou, brother of Henry III. and many subsequent monarchs. Dunheved is incorporated as a free borough by Richard (Plantagenet), Earl of Cornwall and Poitou, in the 13th century, and the borough appears to have had a mayor as early as 1257. The sanitary arrangements are under the jurisdiction of the Town Council, who assumed the duties of the Sanitary Authority on the extinction of the late Local Board of Health, on the 9th Nov. 1889, at which date also the borough was extended by provisional order, and now includes the parish of St. Mary Magdalene, hamlet of St. Thomas, and the urban portions of the parishes of St. Thomas the Apostle, St. Stephens and Lawhitton. The Corporation consists of a mayor, four aldermen and twelve councillors, with a town clerk and other officers. The borough has a commission of the peace, granted 1st July, 1890, but is under the control of the county constabulary. The borough in 1295 returned two members to Parliament, as did also the ancient borough of Newport, in St. Stephen's parish, but on the passing of the Reform Act, in 1832, the two boroughs were consolidated and enlarged, and returned one member until 1885, when the independent representation was merged into that of the county by the "Redistribution of Seats Act" of that year. The town is lighted with gas by a local company, from works at St. Thomas, and with electricity by the Launceston and District Electric Supply Co. Limited. The water supply is derived from a moorland stream at Carne Down, in the parish of Altarnun, about 10 miles distant from Launceston, whence, after filtration, the water is conveyed by a 6-inch main to an open service reservoir at "Windmill," a lofty eminence 4 acres in extent, overlooking the town, which the Corporation purchased in 1896 and laid out as a pleasure ground. The service reservoir has a capacity of about 400,000 gallons, and thus ensures a continuous day and night supply to the town. The present waterworks, the property of the Corporation, were constructed at a cost of about £11,000. The Corporation are also owners of the Trethorne and Tregadillett waterworks, about 4 miles from Launceston, in the parish of St. Thomas the Apostle, and the Trebursye waterworks, in the same parish, and about 2½ miles from Launceston, from which the town was supplied previous to 1895. The Corporation now utilize the former works for supplying the Public Baths, while the Trebursye stream is being allowed to flow into the Kensey.

The footpaths in and about the town have been improved by the Corporation, at a cost of £1,000. The Corporation have also provided extensive works near St. Leonard's for the disposal and treatment of the sewage of the town, at a cost of about £6,000, and an excellent cattle market was constructed about 1901 in Race Hill, at a cost of £4,000. The markets are governed by a Local Act obtained in 1840. The Castle, the church of St. Mary Magdalene and the remains of the Priory buildings at St. Thomas are among the leading attractions of the borough.

The parish church of St. Mary Magdalene, built in 1524-40, by Sir Henry Treccarrell kt. is an edifice of granite, in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel, nave of eight bays, aisles, south porch, over which is a parvise, and an embattled western tower, of the latter part of the 14th century, 84 feet in height, with pinnacles, and containing a clock and 8 bells, two of which were added in 1901: the tower was formerly detached, but is now connected with the church by a room erected by the 5th Duke of Northumberland (d. 1867) for municipal purposes and now used as a vestry: the exterior walls are elaborately panelled and relieved in the basement with quatrefoils, alternating with shields and fleurs-de-lys; above is a boldly moulded plinth, then another course of panelled tracery, with inscriptions running round the building from the chancel door eastward, a shield bearing a coat of arms, separating each word, as follows:—"Ave Maria, gratia plena, Dominus tecum. Sponsus amat sponsum. Maria optimam partem elegit. O quam terribilis ac metuendus est locus iste. Vere aliud non est hic nisi domus Dei et porta coeli"; above is a course of foliated ornaments: the battlemented parapet and the buttresses between the windows are also elaborately carved: at the apex of the chancel window are the arms of Henry VIII. and in an arched recess at its base a recumbent figure of St. Mary Magdalene, flanked on either side by sculptured panels: on the front of the porch, between the parvise windows, is a niche of tabernacle work; below are the arms of Treccarrell, with the date 1511, and under the windows sculptures of St. George and the Dragon, and St. Martin of Tours dividing his cloak with a beggar, with several other devices: at the east end of the north aisle is an elaborate monument with effigies to Sir Hugh Piper, ob. 1587, and Sibella (Parr), his wife, ob. 1704, and in the same aisle a magnificent cenotaph, supported on marble pillars, to Granville Pypar, ob. 1717, and Richard Wise, ob. 1726, both aldermen of this borough, with figures of various Virtues, and robed busts of the two friends: there are other memorials to Philip Kent, gent. ob. 1636, and Mary, his wife, ob. 1626; Leonard Treise esq. J.P. recorder of Truro, ob. 1653; Emlen, wife of Sir John Speccott, ob. 1659; Captain Philip Piper (son of Sir Hugh), ob. 1677, and Mary (Gaer), his wife; Cresten (Stokes), wife of Thomas Bewes, ob. 1679; William Oliver A.M. fellow of this collegiate church, and rector of the Free School, ob. 1681; John Ruddell A.M. 35 years vicar, ob. 1698, and Sarah, his wife, ob. 1667, besides many others of later date: there is also a curious little brass effigy of a female, c. 1630, probably by some local artisan, but without name: the stained east window was presented in 1858 by Edmund Spettigue; all the other windows, save one, are also stained, and six of these are memorials: the church was restored in 1852 and again in 1893, when the present benches of carved oak were provided and other improvements carried out at a cost of £2,500: the choir stalls, of richly-carved oak, were presented at the same time by the Ching and Northmore Lawrence families: the screens separating the chancel from the Lady Chapel were erected in 1903 as a memorial to the wife of the Rev. T. J. Nunn M.A. vicar 1890-1907: the organ, originally a gift from the 6th Duke of Northumberland, has been renovated and enlarged: a screen of carved Austrian oak, consisting of a series of panels and niches containing figures of saints, was erected in July, 1911, at a cost of £800, to commemorate the fourth centenary of the building of the church: in December of the same year a reredos was erected in memory of the late William Andraw esq. M.B. who was a churchwarden

for 24 years: over the south porch is a small chamber, which has been fitted up as a theological library for the use of the clergy of the rural deanery of Trigg Major: in the churchyard, surmounting a modern tombstone, is the head of an ancient cross. The register dates from the year 1558, the earlier portion being a transcript. The living is a vicarage, net yearly income £168, including 22 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Truro, and held since 1907 by the Rev. Frank Ernest Lewis, of Queen's College, Birmingham, hon. canon of Truro and surrogate.

The Congregational chapel, built in 1722, stands at the junction of Northgate and Castle streets, and is a plain building, holding 500 persons. The United Methodist chapel, in Tower street, erected in 1807, in place of a former chapel, built in 1857, will seat 300 persons, while that in St. Thomas' road, built in 1840, has 300 sittings. The Wesleyan chapel, in Castle street, erected in 1870, is a building in the Early English style, with tower and spire, and occupies the site of a former chapel, built in 1812, itself replacing one formerly existing in Tower street, erected in 1785: the present edifice will seat 800 people. The Baptist chapel, in Western road, built in 1829, at a cost of about £700, will seat 130 persons.

A Burial Board of nine members was formed in 1881, and a piece of ground 1 acre in extent, and 1 mile from the town on the Bodmin road, acquired, at a cost of £100, and formed into a cemetery, and in 1895, 2 acres adjoining were added. The Nonconformists have a cemetery at the bottom of St. Thomas' hill; and there is an old Church cemetery, now disused, in Dock-acre road; neither of these possesses a mortuary chapel.

The Guildhall, opposite the western entrance to the Castle grounds, erected in 1881, is used both for municipal purposes and for the business of the borough and county petty sessions. In the Guildhall are some valuable paintings, including a replica of Van Dyck's celebrated painting of King Charles I. on horseback, and believed to have been presented to the town by the king; there is also a portrait of Hugh, 2nd Duke of Northumberland, by Sir Thomas Lawrence, and portraits of John Ching, John Dingley, Edward Pethybridge, Richard Peter, Richard Penwarden and John Kittow, former mayors of the borough. There is also a memorial to the Launceston men who fell in the South African war, and a stained glass window to commemorate the visit of Their Majesties King George V. and Queen Mary, then Prince and Princess of Wales, in June, 1909. The Corporation insignia includes two maces, a mayor's chain and badge and borough seals; the maces, of silver, and 33 inches in length, are quite similar, and have beautifully chased shafts and richly ornamented knobs and bases, the latter being flat and bearing a representation of the borough seal in relief; the heads display the national badges crowned, and have a cresting of crosses and fleur-de-lis, with open arched crowns above; both were given in 1679 by Sir Charles Harbord kt. M.P. for Launceston 1661-79: the mayor's badge, presented by Alderman John Ching in 1881, is of gold and enamel: the chain, given by past mayors and their relatives, each of whom contributed a gold link, consists of shields of the arms of Cornwall and roses, united by a series of ornamental links, bearing the names of past mayors and other officers; the pendant badge exhibits the borough arms:—gu. a triple round tower, or, within a bordure, az. charged with eight turrets of the second; crest, mantling and motto: the mayor's robe is of dark purple cloth, faced with fur. The Corporation also possess a loving cup of silver, 17 inches high, given by Thomas Bowlby M.P. in 1780, and a fine oak chest, carved in front with figures of swans and arabesque foliage.

The Town Hall, which adjoins the Guildhall, and was erected in 1887, at a cost of about £2,300, is a building of stone in the Gothic style, from the designs of Mr. Otto B. Peter F.R.I.B.A. of Launceston, and the late Mr. Hine, of Plymouth, architects, and will seat 1,000 persons.

The Butter and Poultry Market, erected in 1840, and occupying the site of the ancient assize courts, is an oval structure surmounted with a turret, containing one bell and quarter chimies. The Meat Market, near the church, was also erected in 1840. A market for cattle is held on the second and last Tuesdays of each month. The weekly markets are held on Saturdays. The trade of Launceston is principally confined to agricultural produce, but there are tanneries and iron foundries in the town. There are four banks and a savings bank. The "White Hart," "King's Arms" and the "Castle" (temperance) are the principal hotels.

The "White Hart" is a building of considerable antiquity, and the fine old Norman archway, forming the entrance, originally belonged to the Priory. The Masonic Hall, a building in the Classic style, in Tavistock road, was erected in 1877, and the Oddfellows' Hall, in Western road, in 1880. There is a local Agricultural Association, a Scientific and Historical Society, and a Land and Building Co.

The Tamar Club, founded in 1865, occupies a portion of the same building as the Savings Bank, in Exeter street, and comprises a circulating library and writing and reading rooms. The Constitutional Club has premises in Guildhall square; there is also a Liberal Club in Northgate street, opened April, 1898. The Borough of Launceston Public Library, prominently situated on the slope of the hill leading from the town to the railway station, is a handsome building, erected from designs by Mr. Silvanus Trevail F.R.I.B.A.; it is sometimes known as the "Passmore Edwards Institute and Adams Memorial," having been presented to the town by the late J. Passmore Edwards esq. at a cost of £2,000, and formally opened April 20th, 1900: the upper portion is rented to the Science and Art Committee, leaving sufficient accommodation on the ground floor for two spacious reading rooms and the library proper: the library contains over 4,000 books and pamphlets; 1,346 of these are in the reference department and 2,548 in the lending department, the remainder being in the reading room. The penny rate, which produces about £75 yearly, together with a few voluntary contributions, is its only source of income. The library is managed by a committee of nine members from the Town Council, together with eight gentlemen of the town and neighbourhood. The Public Swimming Bath, Tredyan road, opened in June, 1898, was erected by public subscription to commemorate the Diamond Jubilee of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria; the cost was £650; the bath is 80 feet by 25 feet, and has 16 dressing boxes and a covered shed 30 feet long, diving boards and sets of rings. The baths are managed by a committee, of which the mayor for the time being is chairman. The Launceston Working Lads' Temperance Institute, in Wooda road, is a building of stone with Bath stone dressings, erected in 1889, at a cost of £1,300, and comprising library, committee and reading rooms, senior members' room, a large hall, seating about 250 persons, gymnasium &c.; the present number of members is 150, all young men and boys who have left school being eligible, provided they are total abstainers; the institute is supported by fees and subscriptions. The County Police Station, Westgate street, erected in 1886, comprises a superintendent's residence, quarters for four constables, and the usual offices and cells: Charities amounting to £1,134 6s. 8d. in Consols are in the hands of the Official Trustees of charitable funds; a yearly rent charge of £1 12s. 6d. issuing out of Hay Common is administered by trustees under a scheme of the Charity Commissioners, the amount being applied towards church expenses; C. R. G. Grylls esq. clerk; the municipal charities consist of £403 7s. 3d. in Consols, the income of which is distributed annually to poor widows and poor of the borough; H. L. Cowland esq. clerk; Lazar Ground Charity, consisting of a yearly rent of £45 and the interest on a sum of £405 7s. 9d. Consols, is devoted principally to the Launceston Infirmary and Rowe Dispensary; H. L. Cowland esq. clerk. Launceston Infirmary and Rowe Dispensary, in Western road, is supported by voluntary subscriptions: the infirmary was founded by the late Sir W. Rowe, Recorder of Plymouth, in 1862, and the dispensary in 1871: the infirmary was enlarged in 1909, at a cost of £1,200, when an operating theatre, surgical and accident wards and a new committee room were added: there are 11 beds.

The town was formerly surrounded by a wall, pierced by three gates, only one of which, Southgate, now exists; over the arch is a room formerly used as a place of confinement for prisoners, but now occupied by the Launceston Scientific and Historical Society for the purposes of a museum. The Northgate was taken down in 1834. The town wall, when intact, was about a mile in extent, and from 7 to 9 feet thick; portions of it still remain.

The remains of the ancient Castle, which is mentioned in Domesday Book, are still very extensive and occupy the summit of a steep and lofty hill, the base of which is washed by the Kensey, a tributary of the Tamar: the elevated mound on which the keep stands, which is partly artificial and about 200 feet above the river, makes that part of the ruins a very prominent object for miles around: the main entrance is on the west, where originally there was a moat, but in 1834 a new

approach was made to the town under the remains of the old tower: from the southern gate of the castle green the wall extends to the south-eastern angle, where stood the "Witches Tower," a structure which unfortunately gave way while the new road above mentioned was being made: from the Witches' Tower the wall extends northward towards the keep, at the foot of which are the remains of another tower: at the northern side of the courtyard is another gate leading into the town; this is in a more perfect state than the rest of the buildings; it had walls to protect the approach and was used as a prison, and here George Fox, the founder of the Quakers, was imprisoned for eight months, when committed in 1656 for distributing a religious paper near the Land's End: the keep, the most prominent part of the ruins, is about 32 feet in height and 18 feet in diameter on the inside, its walls being about 12 feet thick, and consists of a circular tower and a strong high wall surrounding it, of considerable thickness, containing two staircases leading to the top: the tower itself, built of hard blue stone, is entered by a low triangular arch: the approach to the platform on which the keep stands is by a long flight of stone steps: no trace whatever remains of any of the buildings in the court yard, and the hall, chambers, chapel and modern gaol were removed when the assizes were transferred to Bodmin in 1838. The grounds around the Castle have been tastefully laid out, and form a pleasing resort for the inhabitants. The Castle and earldom was held from the Conqueror by Brian de Bretagne until 1075; afterwards by Robert, Count of Mortain, the Conqueror's own half-brother, followed by 10 other Earls of Cornwall until 1336, when the title became extinct, to be revived in 1337 as a dukedom when Edward the Black Prince was created the first Duke of Cornwall; in 1045 it was held for Charles I. by Sir Richard Grenville, but surrendered to Fairfax in March, 1646: it is extra-parochial. A lease of the Castle, at a nominal rent, has been granted to the Town Council by the Duchy of Cornwall, and H.M. King George V. then Duke of Cornwall, on his visit to the town, 8th June, 1909, conferred on the mayor and his successors the office of constable of the castle.

**ST. THOMAS THE APOSTLE.**—This parish is closely connected with Launceston, the greater area being beyond the municipal limits. An angle of the parish, forming part of the municipal borough of Launceston, has separate rates and officers, and is called St. Thomas Street Hamlet. The parish is bounded on the north by the Kensey, which discharges itself into the Tamar, near Polson bridge. The church of St. Thomas the Apostle, which occupies part of the site of the priory, is an ancient building in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel, nave of five bays, south aisle, south porch, vestry and organ chamber on the north side and an unbattled western tower containing a peal of 6 bells: there is an ancient and unusually large Norman font of Polyphant stone, carved with figures of an oriental character: in the aisle are the remains of some ancient fresco paintings, representing the legend of St. Roque: the chancel retains a cinque-foil-headed piscina and a bracket: the church affords 260 sittings. The register dates from the year 1673, but the earlier portions, dating back to 1480, are incomplete. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £200, with residence, in the gift of the ratepayers of the parish, and held since 1911 by the Rev. John James Haworth B.A. of Cambridge University. The vicarage, which stands on St. Catherine's hill, overlooking the church, was built in 1397. The mission chapel of St. Mary the Virgin, situated at Tregadillett, about 2½ miles from the church, was erected in 1875, at a cost of £1,000, for the use of those who reside in that part of the parish: it consists of an apsidal chancel and nave, and is so arranged that, by means of a movable partition, the nave is utilized as a school on week days; it will seat 150 persons. A Wesleyan chapel, containing 200 sittings, was erected at Tregadillett in 1874.

Here was anciently a priory of Austin canons, founded in 1170 by Robert Warlewast, Bishop of Exeter, and dedicated to St. Stephen; the site is partly occupied by the church of St. Thomas, and portions of the buildings have been incorporated with the fabric of that church, and also with adjacent houses; remains of the priory have also frequently been met with in the neighbouring fields, as well as stone coffins and parts of human skeletons: the fine Norman doorway of the priory now serves as an entrance to the White Hart hotel. A subterranean communication is supposed to have existed between the priory and the castle: on the dissolution of the former there were eleven canons, and revenues valued at £354.

In 1886, during the progress of works connected with the North Cornwall railway, the foundations of buildings on the south side of the cloister garth were uncovered and destroyed; and in 1888 excavations made by the Launceston Gas Co. on the site of the eastern limb of the priory church, revealed the foundations of the presbytery and its adjacent chapels, and several vaults and graves were also met with. In 1893, by permission of T. P. Trood esq. J.P. from whom part of the site was purchased, excavations were made under the direction of Mr. Otho B. Peter F.R.I.B.A. hon. sec. of the Launceston Scientific and Historical Society, and the results are such as to afford new and valuable information both as to the plan of the church and its architectural features, which appear to be uniformly of the 12th century: the buildings, when complete, included the church of about 260 feet in length, and comprised a western tower 30 feet square, nave with aisles, having a total width of 60 feet, north transept about 40 feet wide, and presbytery about 60 feet long, with small chapels opening into its western end: the cloisters, on the south side, appear to have had, including the alleys, now gone, a total length of 90 feet, and were 60 feet wide; around were grouped the usual buildings, the foundations of some of which have been uncovered; these include parts of walls belonging to the lavatory, refectory and cellarer's buildings, and the westernmost wall of the buildings on the west side of the cloister garth, besides a cell, with tiled flooring still intact, and numerous pieces of carved stone work; in the area of the church the site of the altar was clearly made out; it stood at the east end of the nave, at a height of 3 feet 6 inches above the floor, and some tiles belonging to the footpace were found on the spot; a stone screen, of which some fragments were discovered, separated it from the presbytery, where there was another altar.

**ST. STEPHENS-BY-LAUNCESTON** is a parish on the road to Stratton and, except a small portion, is now included in the borough of Launceston, separated on the south by the river Kensey from the parish of St. Thomas, bounded on the east by the Tamar and on the north by Devonshire; here is the terminus of a branch of the Great Western railway from Plymouth, and a station on the main line of the London and South Western railway. The ancient borough of NEWPORT, which forms part of this parish, sent two members to Parliament from 1529 till its disfranchisement under the Reform Act in 1832, but it was never incorporated. The church of St. Stephen, the mother church of Launceston and the surrounding parishes, is a spacious building of grey granite and Polyphant stone in the Norman style, consisting of chancel, nave of four bays, south aisle, lady chapel and vestry, transepts, south porch with parvise and a lofty unbattled western tower with pinnacles containing a clock and 6 bells, dated 1779, and re-hung in 1892: at the east end of the chancel, a large sculptured stone was found in 1883, with a seated figure, life size, representing Christ in Majesty: on the exterior of the same wall, at the north end, there is a similar stone, much mutilated, apparently representing the Virgin and Child, and forming the tympanum of a blocked-up doorway; at the opposite end are the remains of another doorway, and beyond the chancel wall, eastward, are the foundations of what was either a sacristy or (more probably) a lady chapel, into which the two east doorways opened; it is probable that the sculpture of "Christ in Majesty" occupied a place above the south doorway, corresponding with that of "Christ in Humility," above the north doorway, and the recovered panel has been refixed accordingly; other interesting remains were also brought to light and are carefully preserved: there are monuments to Marie Pomeroy, ob. 1630; Margaret (Escott), wife of Digory Prowt, ob. 1641; Margaret Prowt, ob. 1674; John Bewes, of Otaoott, ob. 1675, and Anne, his wife, ob. 1675, with others of later date: the font is Norman: the chancel retains its ancient piscina and has a new reredos of Bath and Caen stone and Devonshire marble, with a sculptured group in the centre representing the "Crucifixion": there is a stained window in the north transept and in the porch is a holy water stoup: the church was thoroughly restored in 1883 under the direction of Messrs. Hine and Odgers, architects, of Plymouth, at a cost of £2,000, and affords 350 sittings. The register dates from the year 1569; many valuable deeds and registers, together with a terrier of the parish, were stolen many years since, but some were afterwards recovered. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £200, including 80 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Truro, and held since 1900 by the Rev.

Ernest Drewe. The vicarage house, adjoining the churchyard, was erected in 1895 at a cost of £1,600. The church room, erected in 1908 by voluntary labour, consists of one large room and ante-rooms. The extension of the old collegiate church was consecrated by Bishop Bronescombe, on Sunday, October 25, 1259, and it was once proposed that it should be the seat of the bishop, but Robert Warlewast, Bishop of Exeter (1159-9), suppressed the college and in its stead founded in 1170 a priory in St. Thomas for canons of the Augustinian order, dedicated to St. Stephen, the revenues of which at its dissolution were valued at £354. In the course of excavations in connection with the building of the church house the foundations of the college of the secular canons were discovered at the south-east of the present church. A silver coin, probably a penny of the reign of Henry VII. was also found. The Catholic church of the English Martyrs, completed in 1911 at a cost of £2,000, is a building in the Byzantine style. The so-called town hall of Newport, built in 1829, is an octagonal embattled structure, pierced on five sides by tall pointed arches, and covers the base and part of the shaft of an ancient cross. The town or church lands produce £73 yearly. There is also an ancient bequest left to this parish of 12 penny loaves, to be given away every Sunday to as many poor persons: and 10s. yearly to the clergyman for preaching a sermon on the 11th of March. Here is a 9 hole golf course, opened in 1910. The soil is clay and loam; subsoil, shaly slate. The chief crops are corn, wheat and barley, with a good deal of pasture land.

Miss A. M. Gurney is the principal landowner in St. Thomas' parish; J. O. Williams esq. of Werrington Park, who is lord of the manor, Miss A. M. Gurney and Richard Carlyon Coode esq. J.P. of Polapit Tamar, are the principal landowners in St. Stephen's parish.

LA WHITTON RURAL is a village and parish near the river Tamar, 2½ miles south-east from Launceston stations on the Great Western and London and South Western railways, in the North Eastern division of the county, Launceston union and county court district, and in the northern division of the hundred of East, petty sessional division of East North, rural deanery of Trigg Major, archdeaconry of Bodmin and diocese of Truro. Under the provisions of the Local Government Act, 1894 (56 & 57 Vict. ch. 73), the ancient parish of Lawhitton has been divided into Urban and Rural parishes, the former being the portion included in Launceston municipal borough; for ecclesiastical purposes they form one parish. The church of St. Michael is an ancient building of stone, in the Decorated and Early Perpendicular styles, consisting of chancel, nave of five bays, south aisle, south porch and an embattled tower on the south side, with pinnacles, containing 6 bells: all the windows except two are filled with stained glass: the font has a massive square basin formed out of a solid block of Polyphant stone, with carved heads at the corners: the south porch retains a holy water stoup: the pulpit, dated 1665, bears the Bennett arms: there are also inscribed floor-stones to members of the family, including one to Richard Bennett, ob. 1619, and a monument to Robert Bennett, of Hexworthy, esq. ob. 1683: the church was partially restored about 1860, and again in 1873, under the direction of the late Mr. J. D. Sedding, architect: there are 220 sittings: the lych gate of oak is a memorial to the Rev. Francis Du Boulay, rector here 1839-92, the work being executed by Hems,

of Exeter. The register dates from the year 1640. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £277, including 112 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Truro, and held since 1892 by the Ven. Henry Houssemayne Du Boulay M.A. of Exeter College, Oxford, archdeacon of Bodmin, hon. canon of Truro and surrogate. The manor of Lawhitton was given to the bishopric of Crediton by Edward the Elder in 905, and the ruins of the episcopal palace still remain. The manor is now in the hands of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, who are the principal landowners. The soil is clayey; subsoil, stone brice. The land is chiefly in pasture; there is a little wheat, oats and barley grown. The area is 2,218 acres of land and 21 of water; rateable value, £2,358; the population in 1911 was 256 in the civil and 299 in the ecclesiastical parish.

LELANT, or Uny Lelant, is a township and parish, opposite Hayle, on the estuary of the Hayle river, with a station on the St. Ives branch of the Great Western railway, and is 3½ miles south-east from St. Ives and 6 north-east from Penzance, in the Western division of the county, hundred of Penwith, petty sessional division of Penwith East, Penzance union and county court district, rural deanery of Penwith, archdeaconry of Cornwall and diocese of Truro. The church of St. Uny is an ancient building of stone, partly Norman, restored or altered in the 13th and 15th centuries: it consists of chancel, nave and aisles of equal height, separated by arcades of six arches, south porch and an embattled western tower, 60 feet in height, with pinnacles, and containing 6 bells, all cast in 1836, and rehung in 1905, when also the tower was entirely restored, the total cost amounting to about £360: the rood loft remains in the north aisle, and there are piscina niches in the chancel and south aisle, and portions of a stoup in the porch: the font, of Early English date, was discovered in a farm yard: the east window is a memorial to William Praed and William Tyringham Praed, 1848, and there are other stained windows: in the church are memorials to the family of Praed, 1620-1846; Pawley, 1635-1721; Cundy, 1799-1802; a brass in the chancel to the Rev. R. F. Tyacke M.A. (vicar 1869-1902) and others: over the entrance of the south porch is an elaborate niche, containing a sun-dial: the communion plate is dated 1725, and there is also a silver chalice and paten, set with turquoise, presented in 1902, in memory of the Rev. R. F. Tyacke: the church was thoroughly restored in 1873, at a cost of £2,000,

when open benches for 420 persons were substituted for the former pews: the roof was also reconstructed and the chancel decorated and paved: a mortuary chapel and additional land for a burial ground, vested in trustees, were added to the churchyard in 1879. In the churchyard stands a massive cross, 5 feet 6 inches high, and 1 foot 7 inches broad; the round head is boldly carved with a St. Andrew's cross, and a boss in the centre; a second cross, 4 feet 6 inches in height, was found about 1906 in a wall near the churchyard; outside the churchyard wall is another cross, 3½ feet high and about 1 foot broad, with an oval head, bearing a Maltese cross, and on the reverse a figure of our Lord. The register of baptisms dates from the year 1684; marriages and burials, 1716. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £278, including 10 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Truro, and held since 1902 by the Rev. William Reid Erskine M.A. of Trinity Hall, Cambridge, and surrogate. There are Wesleyan chapels at Lelant Town and Polpear and Primitive Methodist at Nines. A fair is held on the 15th of August, yearly, for cattle. There are excellent golf links in this parish, with a course of 18 holes, varying in length from 137 to 437 yards; the round extends to over two and a half miles, and contains almost every kind of hazard; there is also a ladies' link of 9 holes inside the long course. Trevehoe, half a mile distant, is the seat of Roger William Giffard Tyringham esq. J.P. who is lord of the manor and chief landowner; the mansion is pleasantly situated, surrounded with plantations, and overlooks the estuary of the Hayle; it
